COME AND SEE!

When two of John the Baptist's disciples recognise Jesus as a rabbi (teacher) they want to know more about him. Their response prompts Jesus to invite them to "come and see". After a day spent with Jesus, learning from his teaching, they recognise Jesus as the Messiah. It is the beginning of a shared life-long commitment to follow Jesus, absorbing and reflecting on his teaching and example.

Today, we are those disciples who are asked to recognise and respond to Jesus. To come and see, but also to go and tell. Paul reminds us of the grace given to us in Jesus which enriches our speaking and our knowledge. As we celebrate education, we look to be attentive to Jesus' teaching and the impact of living out his example in our lives, as well as remembering the gift of teaching and learning that sustains communities around the world as they grow from generation to generation.

This pattern of finding Jesus and being invited to continue a journey with him is important to Christians around the world. In the centenary year of the Week of Prayer for Christian Unity, Christians across denominations are considering what it means to 'pray without ceasing'. We are also called to respect all of God's creation. When we are in communities and situations where we do not see God's justice and love we are called to pray, reflect and act, to help to change the world into the likeness of the Kingdom that Jesus taught about.

If you feel unable to devote a whole service to celebrating the theme, you may want to use some of the ideas on other occasions, such as at the start or end of the academic year, either in your church, or in local schools, colleges and universities.

IDEAS & SUGGESTIONS FOR SHARED WORSHIP

- Ask some pupils and students and adult learners to share what they find difficult or challenging at school, college or university and pray for those issues.
- Ask a few people to share one thing that Jesus has taught them which they want to thank him for.
- Pray for each of the schools, colleges and universities in your town or local area.
- Pray for each of the teachers in your congregation or school.
- Invite someone to talk about their personal journey of faith, from their first encounter with Jesus to the present.
- Use a dramatic reading from *The Gospels Unplugged* by Lucy Moore (www.brf.org.uk) called 'Blessing children'. It's a humorous but challenging poem which talks about Jesus the Rabbi and his attitude to children, based on Luke 18:15-17.

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
